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## Light rail campaign continues with Labour in Manchester

*TramForward* opened the light rail event at the Labour party conference on 23rd September...

A fringe meeting of the All-Party Parliamentary Light Rail Group, was addressed by TramForward's Jim Harkins as the first speaker. He was followed by presentations by political and transport industry representatives. The meeting was chaired by Graham Stringer MP.

The points made by TramForward included the difficulties faced by light rail promoters in the UK. These contrast with the clear benefits felt by cities where modern tramways are implemented, of which Manchester is a prime example - with significant expansion of its Metrolink system now underway.

Over seventy people listened to Mr Harkins's presentation, which described the economic, social, environmental and health benefits of comprehensive urban public transport with light rail at its heart.

"Light rail development regenerates cities, bringing new business and new jobs," said TramForward's Geoff Lusher. "At the same time, it is an exemplar of green growth - reducing energy use and carbon emissions while increasing travel opportunities work, leisure and tourism. If we are serious about reducing congestion and pollution in our cities, trams are the way forward."

TramForward made a presentation at a similar event on 14th September at the Liberal Democrat conference in Bournemouth, and a further meeting will be held on 30th September at the Conservative party conference in Birmingham.
